

MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Dear Members,

By all accounts and with great thanks to each of you, HGEA enjoyed a very successful 2022.

Together, we ratified 4-year contract agreements for units 2, 3, 4, 6, 8, 9, 13, and 14, and our newest unit 15 won its first contract in arbitration. After a long four years, the 26th Biennial General Assembly met in-person in Waikoloa to conduct the union's business and for fellowship. We built upon the Stewards Academy to grow the next generation of leaders. Our advocacy team and Maui County members presented a strong case and won a precedent-setting arbitration on temporary hazard pay.

We emerged from COVID by opening our union hall and hosting two successful *HGEA Grindz* events, each featuring over 30 local small businesses and food trucks – with many vendors selling out within an hour. We elected Governor Josh Green and Lieutenant Governor Sylvia Luke, U.S. Senator Brian Schatz, Congresswoman Jill Tokuda, and many more pro-worker legislators across the state. We grew our social media and revamped our communications program – including this edition of *The Public Employee* which was launched online.

To date, we've awarded over 2,300 scholarships and grants to HGEA members and dependents. In all, we welcomed 2,591 new HGEA members this year. We closed out the year with the 12 Days of HGEA-Lidays giveaway in partnership with our newly launched Makana Perks and Discounts program.

It's been quite a year.

Looking forward to 2023, although we are at a precipice, I'm hopeful and cautiously optimistic. With Josh Green as Governor, the new administration is taking shape. Senate President Ron Kouchi and Speaker Scott Saiki maintain their leadership roles in the Legislature and the Capitol will be full of eager newcomers. Although it's a new beginning for state government, we cannot rely solely on our elected leadership – we all must step up and actively participate in shaping the Hawaii we want, for our children and our grandchildren.

Let us reflect and enjoy the hard-fought victories of 2022, but not relent. The work is not yet done. We must continue to increase our membership numbers – and for those of you lucky enough to retire, we need you in our Retiree Unit ranks. We must continue the fight for pay equity and as the State Political Action Committee and Board of Directors identified, government must do more to retain the best and brightest in our workforce.

Lastly, we must remain a strong member-driven organization. HGEA's success hinges on you, all 36,000 of you. We need your active participation, starting with the 2023 Legislative Session and including the upcoming Board of Directors election in May.


I am so proud to stand with you – in our successes and in the upcoming fights ahead.

MAUI COUNTY EMPLOYEES AWARDED TEMPORARY HAZARD PAY



Throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, HGEA members kept Hawaii running by providing essential services at the risk to their own health and their families' safety. HGEA has fought for years to have these temporary hazardous working conditions acknowledged by employers in the form of temporary hazard pay (THP).

In October, HGEA celebrated its first win in arbitration hearings against the County of Maui for over 1,300 HGEA bargaining unit members. The decision awarded THP compensation of a 15% or 25% THP differential during the period of March 4, 2020 to March 25, 2022.

HGEA held a Virtual Town Hall to answer questions by affected members and is closely following the progress of funding and pay schedules for its Maui County employees.

HGEA takes the result of this case as a positive sign as it remains in the grievance process in all other jurisdictions.

"This is a precedent setting award," said HGEA Executive Director Randy Perreira. "We look forward to resolving similar grievances with other jurisdictions so that our members can move forward and focus on serving our community."



HGEA's headquarters has stood in the heart of historical downtown Honolulu since 1964. The pandemic brought an eerie silence to the once-bustling streets filled with a healthy mix of business professionals, university students, and tourists.

HGEA Grindz was conceived as a way to bring life back into the downtown community. Since "small kid time," sharing food has always been an act of love. There was no better way to connect local small businesses, HGEA members, and the Hawaii community than ono food.

The first *HGEA Grindz* event was on July 20, 2022. Over thirty vendors sold poke, laulau, plate lunch, lechon, pastele, andagi, mochi, desserts, and so much more. As the first event of its kind, vendors were not sure what kind of turn out to expect. They were overwhelmed with its success, however, with many selling out before the event ended.

After witnessing the community support for the first event, HGEA hosted a second *HGEA Grindz* on October 21, 2022 with even more food vendors. Once again, the air was filled with mouth-watering smells and the pleasant hum of chatter over shared food and people talking story with friends and family.



A student in Hawaii's public school system is the product of an entire school community. It takes the work of many HGEA members in the Department of Education (DOE) to meet students' needs such as school office staff and administrators who keep operations running, educational assistants who work alongside teachers to help students learn, security attendants who keep students safe, food service staff who prepare meals, and specialized service staff such as librarians, health aides, psychologists, speech pathologists, behavioral health specialists, and many more.

This extensive network of school support staff is often overshadowed by the issues of teacher pay and retention. An example of this is the passage of the state budget that included \$132 million intended to address salary compression issues for teachers. While the correction in salary is well-deserved for Hawaii's teachers, it was done outside of collective bargaining and ignores all other classifications and positions that have long been underpaid and understaffed.

HGEA ensured that its DOE members were not forgotten by demanding to bargain with the DOE and organizing members to attend Board of Education (BOE) Strategic Planning Sessions that were held across 15 complexes in October and November.

HGEA members attended the meetings and spoke about the essential services they provide to students and important issues to consider in the final strategic plan. HGEA continues to work with members and will remind the BOE about members' concerns during all stages of their strategic planning and approval of the DOE operational budget.

HGEA ENDORSED CANDIDATES WON

Coming into 2022, HGEA State PAC Chair Justin Lam knew this election season would be tough. "HGEA always comes out in force in election years. That's one piece of what makes us so powerful at the legislature. But there was some political uncertainty after the COVID-19 pandemic and challenges to endorsed candidates brought on by redistricting."

The HGEA community answered the call for endorsed candidates with an impressive amount of PAC-tivities for the primary and general election - canvassing neighborhoods, phone banking, sign waving, writing friend-to-friend cards, rubber-banding literature, and more.

The majority of HGEA's endorsed candidates won, including Brian Schatz for U.S. Senate, Jill Tokuda and Ed Case for Congress, Josh Green and Sylvia Luke for Governor and Lieutenant Governor, and Rick Bissen for Maui Mayor. HGEA looks forward to working with our new leadership to achieve our legislative priorities in 2023.

NOTICE OF AFSCME AFFILIATION FEE INCREASE



Effective January 1, 2023, the AFSCME Affiliation fee will increase by 45 cents per month for full-time employees and 35 cents per month for part-time employees. This increase in the AFSCME Affiliation fee occurs because of HGEA's legal affiliation with

As HGEA's parent union, AFSCME helps protect the interests of 1.4 million members nationwide and is a leading advocate on national issues such as pensions, privatization, worker rights, fair taxes, and health care. AFSCME also provides assistance and resources to HGEA for bargaining, organizing, political action and education and training. The affiliation fee will increase from \$14.45 to \$14.90 and \$10.75 to \$11.10 per month for full-time and part-time employees, respectively.
